Alpaca is a world unto itself! It is one of the premier fibers in use for garments or other craft projects. If you have not worked with the soft, soft down which the Alpaca creates, and you like to work with your hands, then this is the project for you!

opened, to see how these things are done on a professional scale. Then we will come home and see how we can improve our own processing!


We will learn how to bring fiber to the spinning stage, which is an art itself. Anyone who spins already will be able to go to the next stage, which enables us to use our spun product. We will accommodate various levels of expertise.

If you are not interested in spinning, you can start on locker hooking, knitting or weaving, for example.

During the year we will visit with expert spinners,

weavers, knitters and other crafters using this fiber. Each person will be introduced to each form, but will be able to choose his or her major project from the craft which interests them the most.

# 4-H Leader Appreciation & Training Day


Saturday, November 2, 2002

# Land Use Ordinance and Your Animal Project!

According to Title 22.08.044.f.(1) Animal Husbandry projects. ... the keeping or raising a calf, horse, goat, sheep, hog, chickens, rabbits, birds or other animals as a current and certified (or otherwise documented) 4-H or Future Farmers of America (FFA) official project is subject to the following 2 standards:

1) Minimum site area. 6,000 square feet for small animals (rabbits, chickens, etc.); 12,000

square feet for small hoofed animals, one acre for horses or cattle. 2) Enclosure required. On any parcel less than one acre, project animals shall be confined in a pen or fenced area that is located no closer than 25 feet to any residence other than that on the project site. Hogs shall not be located closer than 100 feet from any dwelling other than those on the project site.

Incorporated cities have their own rules and regulations regarding 4-H livestock projects. If you have any questions in regards to Code Enforcement, for North County, please call Harley Voss at 461-6199. For South County,

please call Linda Jones, Admin. Asst. at 781-4571.

# Horse Lease Agreements

If you are leasing a horse and plan on using the horse as part of a 4-H project, you must have a 4-H Horse Lease Agreement\* filed at the 4-H Office at least 120 days prior to any Horse Field Day, Fair Horse show or 4-H Horse competition. Late forms will be rejected. Contact the 4-H Office if you need the form (781-5943).

\*This agreement is for 4-H Office records only. It is not intended as an actual, legal lease agreement. We recommend that parties involved in leasing a horse have their own terms and conditions outlined in a separate legal agreement.




